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### **FOREWORD - UNSUSTAINABLE DEBT BY TED COOKE**

Every round of stimulus right now to correct government caused closure of small businesses - they are usually around 40% of the economy - is adding unprecedented debt to an already unfathomable number. Debt the federal government is taking on for the \$1.9 Trillion "relief" bill? Almost \$6,000 per capita. 100% borrowed.

This 1.9 Trillion-dollar spending spree - 90% has nothing to do with "stimulus" - will nudge our national debt up to around \$30 Trillion. Divide that by 330 Million individuals and the federal government has overspent a total of \$91,000 per man, woman and newborn child in our nation.

This overspending has been on top of the current \$11,500 per man, woman and child which the federal government collects as taxes and spends each year. That's just federal. Washington State debt is running around \$13,500 per man, woman and child, this on top of the more than \$7,000 per individual that the state spends each year. Just state and federal debt has now reached over \$104,000 per individual.

King County total debt was around \$5 Billion in 2018, or over \$2,200 per individual. That was before the shutdowns. Seattle City debt runs around \$5,500 per individual. Add that up and a citizen of Seattle has federal, state, county and municipal government debt of more than \$112,000.

For a citizen of Kent the number is lower. \$2,520 per capita municipal debt, making the figure around \$109,500 government debt per person. These numbers don't even include potential local debt from school districts, fire districts, transportation districts, port districts, hospital districts, sheriff districts, water districts, sewer districts, conservation districts and more. Young couple with child? More than \$330,000 of government debt. How much is their home value or personal net worth? They're going to have to pay in the form of lost economic opportunities, devalued money and future taxes.

This is a reason why our party is a big tent. We can all rally around the need for government to start living within its means. In this newsletter you'll hear from all sides of our party, from people who don't support Trump and people who do, from writings which sound like the founding father George Mason's measured and respectful centrism to writings whose fervor seems to mirror that of "give me liberty or give me death" Patrick Henry. # TEAM MEMBER INTERVIEW - ARI HOFFMAN

*Every month we highlight an individual who is helping to make a difference for the King County Republican Party. This month's interview is with Ari Hoffman, a former candidate for Seattle City Council, business owner and outspoken blogger, writer & radio personality advocating common sense solutions to Seattle's current problems.*

Interviewer: Please tell me a little bit about your background.

Ari: Sure, I'm an orthodox Jew and moved here from New York about seventeen or eighteen years ago now. My wife's a fourth generation Seattleite, so we came out here to be closer to her family so they can spend time with the kids. And we used to love living here.

Seattle started taking a really bad downward spiral about five or six years ago. My office was in Georgetown and we were dealing with the RVs and break-ins all the time. I owned three businesses at that time and every one of them started to suffer. One was property management. All of the properties I managed were constantly being vandalized and broken into. I owned an event rental company where we would set up in parks. Our property would get stolen and people would overdose next to the bounce houses when kids were around. So I started getting involved in politics because it started affecting our lives directly. And then I decided, OK, enough complaining about it on Facebook, let's try running for office.

Interviewer: That's sad. My grandparents lived in Georgetown when I was a kid, I used to ride a bicycle around the streets down there.

Ari: I wouldn't do that anymore (laughter) I mean the only people riding bikes down there look like something out of an apocalypse movie.

Interviewer: Yeah, exactly. So, what is your part in helping King County and the Seattle area?

Ari: Right now it seems that most people have their heads in the sand and are not aware of what's going on. If you don't bring awareness of what's going on they have no clue. So I learned the hard way during my campaign, even though I thought my word was getting out there, most people do not realize the fact that the bad government policies are making all of this happen, or worse yet they agree with them. When you talk to Democrats one on one, for example, most of them have common sense approaches and think, 'enough is enough', and, 'this is ridiculous'. But unfortunately Seattle's government isn't controlled by Democrats, it's controlled by the hard Alt Left. That's who's running the show around here. And until we break through that log jam and get more common sense ideas out there, and get Democrats comfortable for voting for someone who doesn't have a 'D' next to their name, I'm not sure anything's ever going to change.

Interviewer: Yeah, it's tragic. A lot of people don't realize how far ideologically Left their leadership is. And if we just label it as being 'Democrats', your garden variety Democrat is usually a well-intentioned person, they work nine to five, they have no idea the policies that their leadership actually wants.

Ari: Exactly, and they don't realize that what happened is the socialists took over most of the local Democrat parties, so they could get the 'D' next to the name of whatever candidate they want to run knowing that they would get elected just with that 'D' alone.

Don't forget, Kshama Sawant was endorsed by the 'Democrats'. She is not a Democrat, she is a communist Marxist. She identifies that was, as a Marxist. So that's how bad things can get.

[Editor's note: Kshama Sawant is a radical Seattle City Council member who once advocated for a revolutionary socialist workers' takeover of Boeing's Everett plant to make busses & mass transit, and who used her door key to let a thousand protestors into City Hall at night during the height of the street protests last summer.]

Interviewer: So was there a watershed event that convinced you to run? I know I ran for the state house twice, and I did it after the state legislature passed a law saying that everyone, even private charities run by nuns, has to pay for abortion through insurance. Was there a moment that caused you to want to run?

Ari: Yeah, the homeless encampments started encroaching on the Jewish cemeteries and we had people overdosing in them. We had RVs dumping human waste and other trash into the cemeteries, it was non-stop and the cost to the cemeteries was hundreds of thousands of dollars. I've been on a cemetery board for almost fifteen years now and the cemetery's been there for a hundred and fifty years, so it was kind of on auto-pilot, it's one of the easiest boards I've been on. And then one day they called me and said they were having this problem. I was blown away by how bad it had gotten. And that's what really started me down this path of local politics.

Interviewer: Thank you for stepping up. So what do you consider to be a few of your talents?

Ari: My talents? I think I have a BS in talking a lot (laughter)

Interviewer: So what are your hopes for the future?

## TEAM MEMBER INTERVIEW - CONTINUED

Ari: For me it's about - the reason I do the podcast, the reason I'm on the radio, the reason I do the writing that I do - is because I'm really just trying to fix this area. I want to stay here, I don't want to move. And I think most people don't want to move but it's getting easier and easier for conservatives, for common sense Democrats and for old school blue-dog Democrats to leave, because they say, 'what is the benefit of staying?' There isn't much of a reason anymore. Everybody has a circle of influence of about a hundred people they can influence. But most people don't want to talk about politics anymore. And they feel politics has ruined everything. But if you can influence some of the people in your sphere of influence, if you can reach a broader audience and bring awareness of what's going on, then you might have an actual chance of turning things around here.

And my question is: How much worse does it have to get before people wake up? I mean, we had an armed occupation of our city last summer for three weeks. And people still voted hard Left in the next election. How much worse does it have to get before people wake up and realize how bad it has gotten here in the Pacific Northwest?

Interviewer: Exactly, and people moving away only creates a negative feedback loop. I can't tell you, going door to door, how many people I met who are conservative or very productive, very talented people saying, 'Hey, as soon as I can I'm moving away from here. I'm going to go to Idaho. I'm going to go to Montana. I'm getting away because of the taxes, because of the crazy policies, because of the homelessness...'

Ari: Yeah, I mean we sold a whole bunch of our family-owned properties this year. We sold our warehouse in Georgetown and we had been there for over a hundred years, but things had gotten so bad. Why should we stay in that area anymore? We are still in Seattle because we have roots here, but that's the first step. And then at what point do we say, 'yeah, we've had enough, it's time to go'? And as Jews, we've had to do that a lot of times through our history. At some point you've just got to get out of there. And unfortunately, at one point a bunch of my relatives in Germany didn't.

Interviewer: Well and it's tragic. I remember just about fifteen years ago Georgetown was kind of an up-and-coming area. There were a lot of new offices, a lot of new businesses, a lot of the brick facades were being cleaned up, it was really a growing community.

Ari: Yeah, it was hopping. It was a social epicenter, we had community events and festivals, and now I wouldn't want to be there on a Saturday night. It's gotten to the point where - I lived in New York for most of my life - I never carried a gun, and I lived in some pretty bad neighborhoods. Now in Seattle when I go downtown or when I go to Georgetown, I'm always packing. What does that say?

Interviewer: So completely shifting gears, what do you like to do for fun?

Ari: (Laughter) I love baseball, I love going to baseball games. I'm a Mets fan. I love water skiing. I love snow skiing. I'll take my kids to Snoqualmie for lessons during the winter. I love going to Crystal Mountain. And I like going to video game arcade places like the Fun Center, that kind of thing, and go-karting.

My kids and I last summer - because they were home from camp, we had nothing to do - we built a go-kart for the kids to zip around the neighborhood. Yeah, I think it concerns the neighbors that they're driving around in Seattle...

Interviewer: (Laughter)

Ari: ...but, yeah, we like that kind of stuff.

Interviewer: So finally, what is your message for others?

Ari: My message for others is it's not enough just to vote any more. You have to get involved, and I realize I'm kind of preaching to the choir here, but think of how many people you know who are not involved. If you don't get them involved, nothing is ever going to change. And being involved in local politics is definitely not one of the sexiest things to do. It's very time consuming and extremely annoying and sometimes you want to bash your head against a wall. But if you want to be able to enjoy the other days of the month rather than the once a month meeting, you need to get involved.

# Could Have Been Written Today

# Classical Thought – Scientific Method

Last summer I was viewing a presentation of the Washington Policy Center given by their science expert Todd Meyers and he said something quite profound.

“The first rule of science is that science is not divisible by 5.”

He went on to explain that if someone says, “We’ve raised the temperature 1.5 to 2 degrees Celsius”, or, “We’ve caused 10% loss of habitat”, those are not scientific numbers on their face. They are made-up round numbers. True scientific numbers are always as exact as possible and almost never divisible by five. Think of the mathematical constants we observe in nature, for example Pi, 3.14159, and the natural constant ‘e’, 2.71828.

A couple of newsletters ago I mentioned that a very common logic fallacy in recent years is “appeal to authority” when a given authority may be entirely wrong. I see no clearer example of this than with assertions that the Left claims are “scientific” but are actually philosophical. From gender to predicting global temperature, the Left often abandons science for articles of faith.

So, what is the Scientific Method? And what are its limits?

The word “science” comes from the Latin “sciencia” which means knowledge, science or skill. It comes from the root word “scio”, meaning to know. Up through the Renaissance the word simply described observations, propositions and beliefs about everything from the natural world to the spiritual world. Much of what was considered “science”, i.e., knowledge, was simply composed of dogma, popular beliefs and elitist dictates from thrones and clergy. (Sound familiar?)

The idea that knowledge should be systematically tested in order to refute incorrect teachings and beliefs was first popularized by Sir Francis Bacon in the early 1600’s. Up to that point testing knowledge wasn’t a very popular idea because refuting teachings or beliefs could mean refuting a monarch or a bishop, an action which could land one in a dungeon or worse. In Bacon’s opus on the knowledge of his day, *Instauratio Magna*, he advocated testing knowledge through experimentation in order to refine it. Not only should observations and generalizations be made about nature, he reasoned, but they should be further grouped into theories of knowledge, and tested so the theories could be refined or refuted.

The reason Bacon was able to popularize and promote such methods was in part because he had used them to successfully refine the formula for gunpowder. What monarch or bishop of that day didn’t want better gunpowder?

In the 1800’s the term “scientific method” was formally defined to mean a process which involves the following –

1. Formulate a question (For example, “Does a popular brand of soap float?”)
2. Formulate a hypothesis (For example, “It does”, “It doesn’t”, etc.)
3. Conduct a series of experiments in a controlled or known environment
4. Record data
5. Come back and apply the recorded data to the hypothesis in order to either prove the hypothesis, disprove the hypothesis, refine the hypothesis or refine the testing methodology.

That’s it. That’s all there is.

# Classical Thought – Scientific Method

Apart from the scientific method one can look for potential historical clues regarding a subject, such as recorded testimony, or one can look at evidential clues regarding a subject – such as objects in layers of rock, gasses trapped in ice, tree rings, etc. Yet in terms of knowing something for certain, there's no substitute for the scientific method as described above.

The limitation of the scientific method is that it only applies to things which are repeatable and observable. There's no way to apply the scientific method to a singularity, a thing which only happens once and was not directly observed in a controlled or known environment. For example, we can't go back to the origin of the universe, observe it happen multiple times, draw data and then test a hypothesis about it. Neither can we do so for the origin of life.

Most "theories" about such singularities – although almost always well intentioned – are more philosophical than scientific. They are untestable and unprovable, which means they aren't really "theories" so much as statements of faith or guiding values.

The reason the scientific method matters is because there are many political issues today that the scientific method speaks directly to:

- **The fact of human gender and chromosomes.**
- **The fact that a human individual's DNA begins forming almost immediately following their conception and is swiftly completed in their first cell.**
- **The fact that there is no current way to accurately measure average global temperature at this moment, much less to predict what it will be in the year 2100.**
- **The fact that carbon dioxide is having a beneficial greening effect on the planet as it helps plants grow.**
- **The fact that always listing a virus as "primary cause of death" when there is no way to accurately test for the presence of the virus makes it impossible to determine the virus' mortality rate.**
- **The fact that an effective ban on long-term vaccine safety studies & reporting renders it impossible to know a vaccine's long-term safety.**

In the early 1800's following the enlightenment's emphasis on facts and knowledge there was a counter movement among philosophers and artists called romanticism. The romanticist belief was that facts and knowledge do not matter as much as human perception, thoughts and desires. They believed that what "is" should be secondary to what "ought" to be. Part of what we're seeing from the political Left today is a postmodernist new form of romanticism which is effectively at war with the enlightenment, which considers facts and knowledge to be immaterial.

There are even some on the Left today, and their ideas are becoming increasingly popular in academic circles, who are arguing that the scientific method does not exist, that observations are not meaningful, and that the word "science" should be broadly interpreted to mean anything the speaker or listener thinks it should mean. This is the postmodernist critique of science and has been referred to as "epistemological anarchism".

It ultimately represents a step backwards, to the time before the scientific method.
